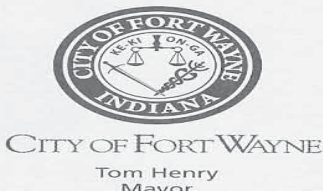

New Year Traditions around the World

If you do a little research you will come to know that be it the western or the eastern part of the world, New Year is celebrated with equal enthusiasm everywhere.

However as the year in the calendar marks a transition, the various New Year Traditions and Customs followed during the period remain as it is. Here's a list of some of the interesting ways to celebrate the New Year across the globe:

England: The English custom for welcoming New Year is full of hospitality and warmth. They believe that the first guest for the year would bring fortune for them.

He should be a male, should enter through the front door and bear some traditional gifts like loaf for the kitchen, drink for the head of the family and coal to light the fire, otherwise he is not allowed. They believe that these bring good luck throughout the year.

Denmark: In Denmark, residents keep a pile of dishes, all broken, in front of the door. For this they save old dishes and People usually throw these on the friends' doors during New Year. This symbolizes friendship and brotherhood and they believe the one with maximum dishes outside, has the most friends. Some Danish are found to leap some chairs during midnight.

China: The Chinese have

a unique way of celebrating New Year, where every front door of a house is painted in red which symbolizes happiness and good fortune. They hide all the knives for the day so that no one cuts oneself, because that may actually cut the entire family good luck for the coming year. However that doesn't make any difference to the feast they have during time.

Brazil: Brazilians believe that lentils signify wealth and prosperity. So they serve food items made up of the legume like soup or rice on the New Year. On New Year's Eve, the priestesses dress up in blue and white for an auspicious ceremony celebrated for the water goddess. Also a sacrificial boat filled with jewelry, candles and flowers from the beach of Rio de Janeiro is pushed to the ocean that brings health, wealth and happiness for them.

Austria: Austrians find good luck charm in Suckling pigs. They serve it on the dinner table with edible pigs and the peppermint ice creams are served as desserts for fortune.

German: Lead is considered to be auspicious here. They pour molten lead into cold water and the shape that is taken after, predicts the future. Heart shapes symbolize marriage whereas round shapes denote good luck; anchor shapes tell that you need help however

a cross signifies someone's sad demise.

Belgium: They call the New Year eve as Saint Sylvester Eve. They believe in throwing family parties, where everyone kisses, exchanges fortune greetings apart from raises toast to welcome the New Year in their own manner.

Children usually save money to buy decorative so that they can write and gift New Year greetings to elders.

Egypt: Egyptians believe that the New Year begins only when the new crescent moon is visible in the sky. They create and extremely festive atmosphere all around and celebrate the New Year with happiness and joy. The official announcement is made in the city of Cairo in a holy mosque, and the religious leaders do the needful.

Greece: they call it a St. Basil's Day, one of the forefathers of the Greeks Church, because it is also celebrated as his death anniversary. They bake some special bread, where a coin is buried inside the dough. The procedure of serving the bread is very unique. They offer the first slice to God, second to the bread winner of the house, and the third is meant for the house. If this one contains the coin, spring will hit early that year. Also whoever get the slice with the coin, is supposed to be blessed with extra good luck.

The letter of notification must be postmarked no later than Dec. 31st.

- Ballots will consist of only candidates' names that meet the requirements of notifying the clubhouse in writing no later than Dec. 31st and are members in good standing of Arlington Park.

- Candidates wishing to have a short article in the "Arlington News and Views" introducing themselves to Arlington residents may submit a biography to the clubhouse before the 1st of January.

All candidates eligible for election and any submitted biography shall be published in "News and Views".

- Proxy Ballots will be available 30 days prior to the election at the clubhouse. Members may obtain a proxy ballot within that time at the clubhouse.

All completed proxy ballots

must be received at the Arlington Park clubhouse by 1st class US Mail or by sealed envelope hand delivered to the Arlington Park clubhouse on or before the 3rd Tuesday in February in order to be counted.

- Voting for positions on the Arlington Board of Directors starts at 7:00 a.m. and ends at 7:00 p.m. on the 3rd Tuesday in February.

Voting takes place at the Arlington Park Clubhouse. No votes will be accepted at the annual meeting.

- The qualifying ballots will be counted by the election committee on the 3rd Tuesday in February.

The committee will validate signatures and lot numbers as votes are tallied.

- The results will be announced by the election committee at the Arlington Park Annual Meeting, by signage at the entrances of the addition, and printed in the "News and Views".

Where and How to Recycle or Dispose of Christmas Trees in Indiana in January 2020



In many urban and suburban areas, Christmas trees are collected from curbside during the first 2 weeks in January.

Allen County residents may drop off and recycle their live Christmas trees at various locations free of charge, starting Thursday, Dec. 26, 2019 to Saturday, Jan. 11, 2020.

Be sure to remove all lights, wire, tinsel, ornaments, nails, stands, other NON-Organic decorative materials and other materials that are not part of the original tree. This includes tree stands also. Flocked trees are usually accepted, but not artificial trees. Large trees (larger than the standard 6 - 7 ft tree) may need to be cut in half to be acceptable by your garbage hauler. But scroll down this page for more specific information and local links.

What happens to the trees? In most cases, the trees are chipped and made into a mulch which is usually made available, free to city or county residents. Important: Never burn your Christmas tree in a fireplace or wood stove. Burning the tree may contribute to creosote buildup and could cause a chimney fire.

Snowmobiling...Not Permitted

Indiana Snowmobile Laws

14-1-3.5-15 Operations Restrictions Sec. 15: A person shall not operate a snowmobile:

1. At a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and proper having due regard for conditions that exist.

2. While under the influence of an intoxicating liquor or unlawfully under the influence of a narcotic or other habit forming or dangerous depressant or stimulant drug.

3. During the hours from one-half (1/2) hour after sunset to one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise without displaying a lighted headlight and a lighted taillight.

4. In any nursery, planting area, or public lands posted or reasonably identified as an area of forest or plant reproduction and when growing stock may be damaged.

5. On the frozen surface of

public waters within one hundred (100) feet of a fishing shanty or shelter except at a speed of five (5) miles per hour or less.

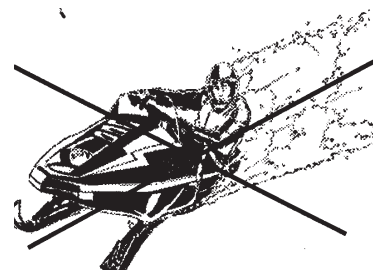
6. Unless equipped with a muffler in good working order and in constant operation to prevent excessive or unusual noise and annoying smoke.

7. Within one hundred (100) feet of a dwelling between 12 midnight and 6 a.m., except on his own property or property under his control or as an invited guest.

8. On any property without the consent of the landowner or tenant thereof.

9. While transporting thereon a bow unless unstrung, or a firearm unless unloaded and security encased or equipped with and made inoperative by a manufactured key locked trigger housing mechanism.

10. On or across a cemetery or



burial ground.

11. Within one hundred (100) feet of a slide, ski or skating area, except for the purpose of servicing the area.

12. On a railroad track or railroad right-of-way, except railroad personnel in performance of their duties.

13. On public property unless authorized to do so.

Coyotes are the most adaptable animal in the world

One of my favorite cartoons when I was growing up was "The Roadrunner," which featured efforts by "Wiley Coyote" to capture and perhaps eat the tricky little creature called a roadrunner.

As it turns out, the roadrunner proves much to smart to be captured—even with the extraordinary efforts and planning by the coyote. The fact there was no actual dialogue in the cartoons was amazing -- even today the cartoons are hilarious.

Recently, sighting of coyotes in our area have increased, and attacks on pets are becoming more common -- which of course causes concern. Here is some info regarding coyotes.

• Coyotes can breed with both wolves and dogs. For example, a type of coyote hybrid named the eastern coyotes contain genes of both wolves and dogs and are known as "coy-wolves" and "coydogs."

• Coyotes are great swimmers, which has helped them colonize islands and spread their populations.

• Although coyotes have been known to attack humans (and pets

and as such are a potential danger to people, especially children, these attacks are rare.

• Coyotes are monogamous and mate for a lifetime.

• Coyotes can run up to 43 miles per hour (69 km per hour). the top speed of a human is 28 mph (45 km per hour).

• Coyotes can eat anything



they can find, including rabbits, rodents, birds, fish, frogs, deer, fruit, grass and carrion.

• Even though they have been hunted and trapped for over 200 years, there are more coyotes today than when the U.S. Constitution was signed.

• Coyotes sometimes walk on their toes to make as little noise as possible.

• The coyote is one of the most adaptable animals in the world. They can change breeding habits, diets and social dynamics to survive in a wide variety of habitats.

• Only 20% of coyote pups survive their first year.

• Coyotes can jump a distance of over 13 feet (4 meters).

• Coyote attacks on humans are rare and usually do not cause serious injuries. Attacks, however, have increased, especially in California.

• Coyotes kill more livestock in wester North America than any other predator.

• The number one most effective way to prevent coyote attacks in your neighborhood is to eliminate wildlife feeding. Coyotes that are fed in residential neighborhoods can lose their fear of people and

may eventually test humans (and pets) as possible prey. Many people unintentionally feed coyotes by leaving pet food or garbage out at night or having large bird feeders. Coyotes are usually not interested in bird food, but bird feeders often attract rodents, especially squirrels, which then attract coyotes.

• Coyotes probably live nearby, even if you don't know it, so do not let pets run loose. When hiking in parks, keep dogs on leashes. Pets left outside, even with fencing, remain at risk for predation. Try not to leave your pets unattended outside.

Free-ranging domestic cats and feral cat colonies may also serve to attract coyotes; it is important that domestic cats be kept indoors.

If you see a coyote during the daytime, you should exhibit caution, as that coyote may have become habituated to humans (and may be more likely to attack). If you are approached by a coyote, you should yell, wave your arms, and/or throw something at the coyote (do not run away).

Fencing may keep coyotes out of a yard, particularly if it is more than six feet in height with a roll bar across the top. Spray repellents (pepper spray, etc.) that you can carry with you have been reported with only moderate to no success.

City of Fort Wayne Emergency Snow Route Preparedness

During our snow fall season there is a project we can all work on together. When snowfall is predicted, it would be helpful if all vehicles were parked in driveways, in the garage. . . . not on the street. Snow removal is difficult, the team removing snow is working late night hours usually through early morning, during white out conditions.

Each year we have complaints that an area was missed, which can happen. After review we often find that someone had parked their vehicle on the street. When the vehicle is then moved it leaves a large amount of snow in front of/ or behind a vehicle, this causes a bottleneck in traffic, especially in the cul-de-sac's.

The US Postmaster has requested all of us to clear snow one (1) foot from the curb and to shovel out around the mailboxes.

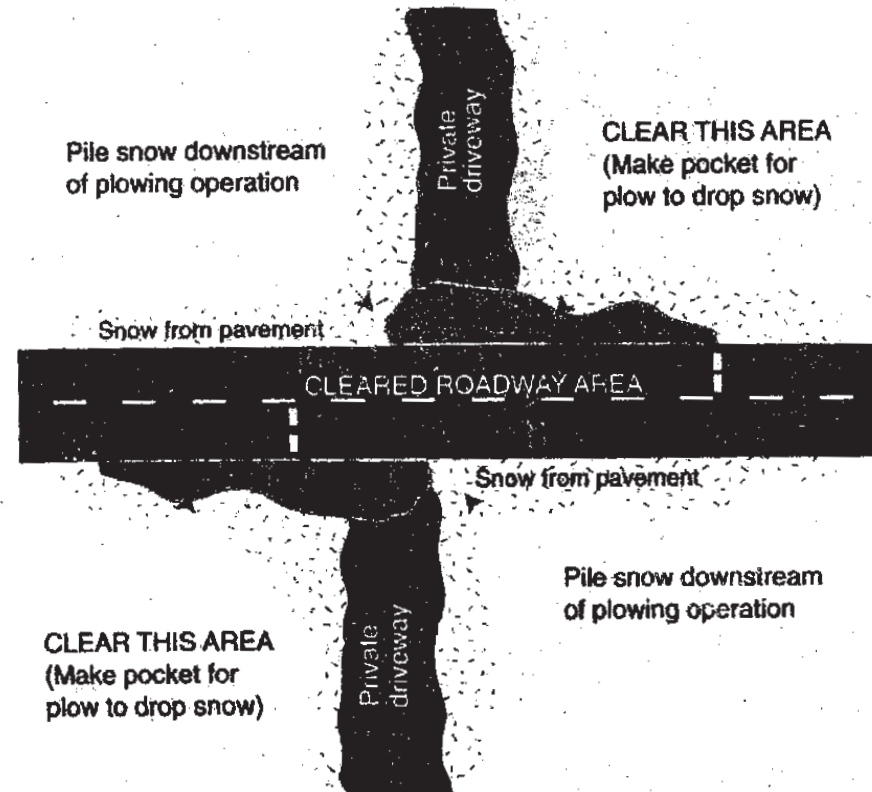
If your neighbor is unable to remove snow due to disabilities or a heart condition. . . . a friendly helping hand is appreciated. (Let me personally thank you in advance for your good deed)

As in the past if any of you are on call or in need of emergency assistance for health conditions, please contact the office so that you may be placed on the list of first alert snow removal.

To qualify for first snow removal it requires that your health or work is of a emergency nature: Doctor, Nurse, Police, Fire worker. Or any member with special health needs. A list is compiled at the office and is submitted to the snow removal team. As in past years the snow removal will begin with the accumulation of 3" of snow. When weather conditions allow sand and salt will be placed at intersections and the primary roads. Sand/ salt barrels will be placed at the entrance ways. These barrels are filled by the city for use by members during treacherous snow and ice conditions.

If you believe your area has been missed during the normal snow removal, please allow enough time for the crew to process through all of the streets. With a team of three trucks it will take approximately 6-7 hours to make one pass completely through the streets in Arlington.

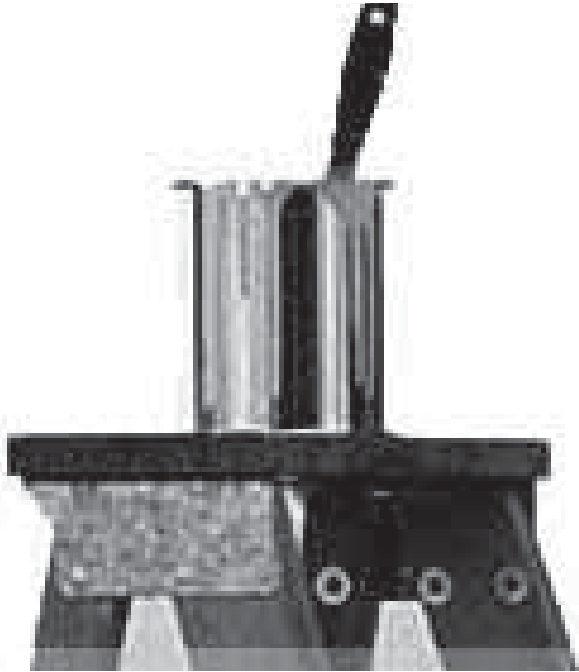

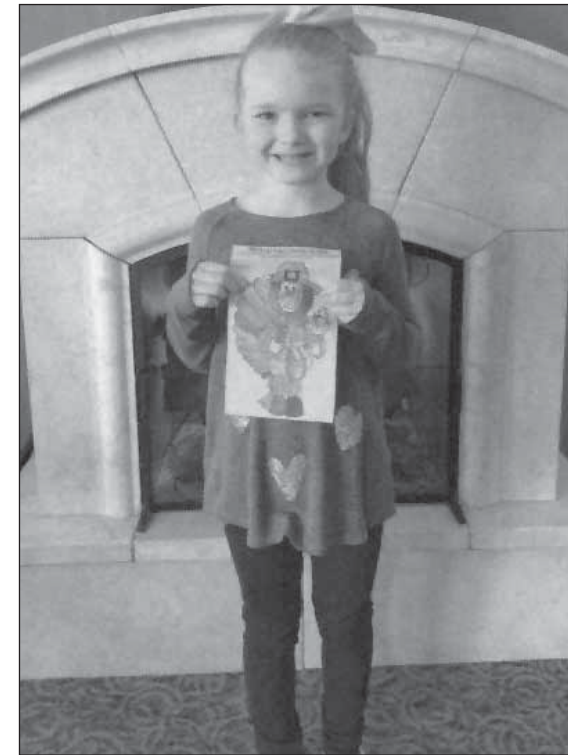

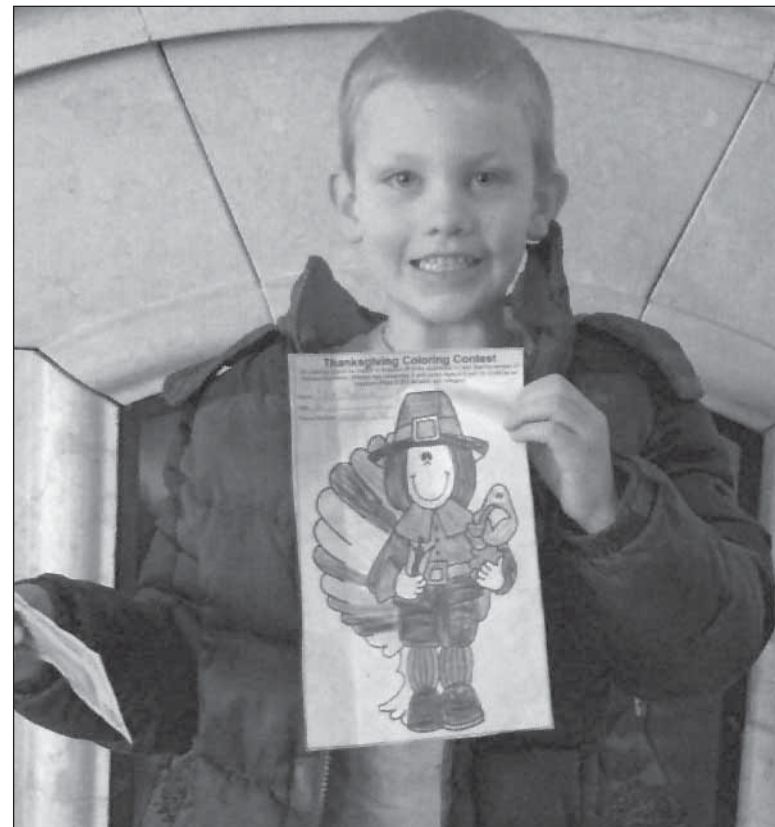
