Fort Wayne's Biodegradable Bag Collection begins

FORT WAYNE. IND. (WANE)--Beginning March 29, the City of Fort Wayne Street Department began collecting biodegradable paper leaf/lawn/ garden bags placed by the curb.

The city asks that residents call 311 after they have filled adn placed the bags at the curb. The bags will then be collected within two business days.

Biodegradable bags placed in alleys will not be collected, the city said.

The collection period will run through April 9, 2021, however, these dates may change due to weather.





The clubface sends it and the path bends it. it's a simple phrase that you'd do well to keep in mind, becasue it helps diagnose the issues facing your game. All you need to know is your club path (which is the direction your club is traveling into impact). the way those two elements combine determines the type of shot you'll hit.

Straight: When the club path is traveling down the target line and your face angle is zero at impact, the ball will go straight. Ideal combo.

Push./Pull: A push or pull happens when your clubface is square to your path, but your path is moving either left or right to your target. So a pull is when your club path is moving left of your target (out-to-in for right-handed golfers) with a closed clubface; a push is when your club is moving to the right of your target (from in-to-out) with an open clubface.

Hook/Slice: Hooks and slices happen when the clubface and path are moving in different directions. If your clubface is open buyt your club path is moving out-to-in: slice. If your clubface is closed and your path is in-to-out: hook.

For Your Information

A neighborhood project everyone may lend a hand!

Keep the storm drains open during our April showers. Please pick up any debris in the street especially around storm drains to allow for the water to flow and keep flooding to a minimum.

Catch basins and sewer inlets are for rainwater and melting snow only. Crews from the City of Fort Wayne's Water Pollution Control Maintenance Department, the department responsible for cleaning catch basins and storm sewer inlets, recently pulled a a number of unusual items out of some City sewers including: boots, cellular telephones, VCRs, realtor signs, buckets and file cabinet drawers.

These items should NOT be put into storm sewer inlets.

The only thing that should ever go into a storm sewer is rainwater or melting snow.

NEVER PUT ANY OF THESE ITEMS INTO A STORM SEWER INLET:

Automobile fluids like oil or anti-freeze, leaves, sand or topsoil, grass clippings or other yard wastes, scrap lumber or any chemicals.

Clogged catch basins and inlets can cause many problems including odors, street flooding, even injury to maintenance employees.

In addition, children should NEVER play in or around storm sewer inlets or manholes. For storm or sanitary sewer questions or emergencies, please call 311.

Call before you dig!

As homeowners you may be purchasing Internet and/or phone services with all of the NEW technology now being offered. This will require companies to dig in our neighborhood. Because Arlington has an elaborate system of greenway lights running behind the homes, this poses a possible predicament.

We are asking all residents planning to add new service or replace old service to give us a call at the clubhouse at 486-1967 or email us: Info@arlingtonpark. net. Before you dig! Arlingtons electrician will locate all of our underground lines free of charge. All we ask is 72 hours notification before the digging is to being.

Lutheran Health Network DAISY Award winner loves listening to patients' stories

Where do you work?

I work in Nursing Administration at Dupont Hospital.

What are your job duties?

As a night supervisor or coordinator, my main focus is being the liaison for administration during the night shift and on weekends, making sure the hospital runs smoothly and safely so the administration team can rest at night and only need to be involved if we call them. I am fielding phone calls, dealing with issues in the hospital, making sure staffing is adequate, and helping any of the units that need an extra hand.

When did you realize you wanted to be a nurse?

I was in elementary school when my sister needed emergency surgery while visiting family in California (our first trip without parents who were home in Pittsburgh). My cousin was a nurse and took me to the hospital where my sister was recovering. I was both impressed and fascinated at the level of care she was receiving, and I wanted to pursue that

shared experience.

Where are you from?

I grew up in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and our high school had a program for health careers. Half of the day we learned about the health care field. My first job in high school was at a nursing home. I worked there for five years and loved it. Caring for elderly patients is still something that I am drawn to. I have learned so much by sitting and listening to their stories of life and family, asking about the biggest changes they have seen in their lives and the lessons they thought were important to pass on.

Where did you get your nursing degree?

I graduated with my BSN from the University of Pittsburgh.

Where have you worked and what jobs have you done?

My start was in cardiac, mostly because it was so intimidating, knowing that the heart functions the entire body. I decided to jump in and learn about what scared me, so I worked with post-cardiovascular surgery patients. After one year, I decided to try travel nursing to California and Las Vegas. That was such an important learning curve. I learned so many things by asking questions, not only in policy and procedure, but more importantly, the lessons life teaches us. It also prepared me to appreciate the current job I have and the people I work with now.

I moved to Fort Wayne when I met my husband and started working at Lutheran Hospital in their Cardiovascular and Transplant Unit. That was also one of my favorite jobs. So many learning experiences and seeing advances happening every day you are working. We had many patients who we would get to know as they waited for a transplant for sometimes months in the unit, and then you were able to share their journey of a new heart, giving them the chance to spend more time with their children and grandchildren. It was a privilege and very gratifying to share those moments with your patients.

In my initial interview at Dupont Hospital, I was so impressed because we shared the same core values that have come to define my nursing career. That is what has kept me here for 15 years. I am proud of how Dupont continually strives to improve and support our teams.

What do you like best about your job?

I love the interaction between the various units and staff in the hospital every night. (I am able to get all my steps in!) To be able to mentor newer nurses, helping to calm their fears by enhancing their skills, and sharing my life experience with them, helps all of us appreciate the privilege we have in taking care of our community. What is the worst thing about your job?

I would have to say coordinating staffing.

How has COVID affected you? Your job, your desire to work, your anxiety level?

I have always gravitated toward the high-intensity situations. This is how you know you were meant to work in an ICU or Emergency Room. You can think clearly in stressful situations. When COVID started, I went into "let's get to work mode."

I am so very proud as a nurse in seeing our staff members and administration team jump in to support our hospital when we needed to make immediate changes. The lessons I learned as a traveling nurse really benefitted me during this pandemic. The most difficult part of COVID is the anxiety of our patients. They cannot have any visitors with this disease, so you become family for some.

I appreciate the ingenuity of nurses putting big pictures of themselves outside of their scrubs so patients could see they are not just this hazmat suit taking care of them. Or taking the time to hold (patients') hands and look into their eyes, finding out their favorite TV show or music station so they have something familiar to hear. Making sure you inform the family and give them some hope, or just to let them know you are doing everything you can to make sure their loved one is comfortable. Making the phone call to the family so they knew you were holding their loved one's hands, praying with them, or even as some of our nurses have done, singing hymns to provide comfort.

What do you see in your future? Would you like to stay where you are, or is there another job or jobs you'd like to move into at some point?

I have felt blessed to find a job that I truly enjoy going to. I look forward to helping to improve where we can go since we don't know when going back to normal will happen. This position is the perfect blend of helping our staff and being able to be at the bedside that I value and enjoy. When not at work I treasure sharing moments with our children, grandchildren and traveling with my husband.

How did you feel about winning the DAISY award (a quarterly award Lutheran Health gives out to nurses who provide exemplary care)? Congratulations, by the way!

I was both surprised and humbled. This award needs to be shared with my fellow supervisors as we are such a cohesive group that really works well together. It is working together that gets us through these times, and I have been blessed to have such a supportive team in administration. I want to be an advocate in finding a job you love, mentoring someone who shares your same career passion, and ensuring our guests truly have the best possible experience.

RAISED BED SOIL RECIPE

This recipe uses tricks from a wide variety of garden methods such as permaculture, hugelculture, biochar and biodynamic, just to name a few. Starting from the bottom to top:

Layers of newspaper or cardboard

Layer of 1/4 to 1/2 mesh hardwar cloth to keep critters at bay.



Layer of small twigs and branches from or any tree except a walnut. This is a version of hugelculture.

4-6 inch layer of leaves of any tree except walnut, maple leaves are best.

Scatter charcoal from a wood fire or scrape charcoal from burned wood over the leaves. Biochar method.

How to check that your swing is on track

Getting your backswing moving in the right direction is an important part of getting your drivers moving in the right direction too. Here's a way to work on it.

Place a foam roller (or alignment stick) parallel to your target line. Put a ball an inch from the roller then address it, aiming your club toward the target and setting your stance line parallel to the roller. You're set to get all-important allel to the roller. You're set to get all-important

feedback on your aim, alignment and swing direction.

Now swing. If your motion is too much from in-to-out, you will hit the inside part of the foam roller. If it moves too much from outto-in, you'll strike the outer portion of the roller. Both of those moves can cause inconsistent contact and directional issues.

Keep in mind that the roller is a visual cue positioned to help you, not scare you. Use it as a guide for your swing.

The goal here is to keep the clubhead flush with the roller or alignment stick as you take back the club. Keep your hands in while moving the club along the foam roller (representing your target line) throughout your takeaway. You're doing it right if you feel your left arm swing across your chest with the club more in front of you.

Coming through, smoothly rotate your body into a full finish. When you miss the roller or rod, you know your swing is back on track.
