Nichole, I know that you have always been interested in design when did you turn your interest into a business?

"In 2015, with motivation from my husband, Bruce. I have a strong entrepreneurial spirit, since my father is a business owner as well. I have a strong desire to help clients with interior design and not just furniture."

How long have you been in business?

"It's been an amazing 6 years that we've been in business."

I know you have a store in New Haven have you considered expanding?

"Absolutely! We are currently working on a second location in downtown New Haven. I love small towns and historical buildings. We are currently refurbishing a building, built in 1899, that will be the new home for our Interior Design clients. We currently have 2 Interior Designers on staff and are looking forward to having a larger space to host clients and events.

What advice would you offer to a first-time homeowner to pull together a design for their home?

"The purchase of a new home can be an extremely overwhelming time. I would recommend working with one of our designers, of course. Some clients just need a few new items to pull the space together with what they already have. As we trend through the covid recovery process how has the increased cost of living impacted the small business owner?

"The increased cost of living is a real thing! We have seen all our product costs increasing at a record pace that the industry has never seen. An annual increase is typically 2-5% and we have seen 10-20% which is unprecedented. In addition, shipping and labor costs have increased significantly. So that's driving additional costs across the entire business."

In closing, what are you most excited about for the future of Nich'e Market?

"I am definitely most excited about our new Design Center. It really is a dream come true for us. Nich'e Design will be 1 block south of our current retail store location (424 Broadway Street) and will offer design services, window treatments, furniture, and accessories. We work with local cabinet makers, granite companies, contractors and will be able to showcase their products as well. 6. The ball must be played in a single movement. You are not allowed to push the ball with the top or bottom of your foot. Your foot should be set separate from the ball, clearly behind, before each kick.

7. Wait to play until the ball has completely come to a rest. (It is not legal to stop the ball from rolling with the wind.)

8. Water Hazard - 1 Stroke Penalty - Replace ball where ball entered hazard.



Visit Johnny Appleseed Festival this year Sept. 18th & 19th, 2021

The annual Johnny Appleseed Festival will be held Sept. 18 and Sept. 19 in Fort Wayne. Here are some of the activities scheduled for this year.

Browse over 100 handmade craft booths

Clothing, candies, soaps and satchels, see a wide variety of crafts and handmade goods.

Though out the festival grounds you will find an assortment of crafters. The items are handmade from materials available in the wilderness areas where Johnny wandered sowing his apple seeds. Wood, cloth, glass and metal come together in the array of finely crafted gifts for the willing buyer.

Delicious goodies await your taste buds

After a few hours of shopping, watching pioneer demonstrations, and playing children's games, you'll no doubt be ready to eat. Fortunately, the Johnny Appleseed Festival offers you plenty of options!

Food vendors at the Johnny Appleseed Festival are required to prepare their offerings using the methods employed during the mid-1800's, the period during which John Chapman lived. Cooking is done over wood or coal fires - electricity and propane are not permitted - and the foods that they prepare must be appropriate to the time period as well. So, you won't see elephant ears, fried Twinkies, or frozen ices in bright plastic cups. The food at the Johnny Appleseed Festival hearkens back to the days of the pioneers. Chicken, cooked over an open fire grill, ham and beans with freshly made cornbread. Grilled turkey legs and buffalo burgers and more.

Since ours is an open-air Festival, you can watch as vendors make fresh caramel corn in giant cast iron kettles, or observe how old-fashioned chicken and dumplings are prepared and served. And of course, there are



numerous selections featuring our signature food - the apple! Apple dumplings, caramel apples, fried apples rolled in cinnamon sugar, apple pie, and plenty of cider - the choice is yours. And the scent of the open air cooking is really something that is beyond description - you have to experience it in person.

Food vendors at the Johnny Appleseed Festival pledge a minimum of 20% of their net profit back to the Festival. It is our primary source of operating income, which has allowed us to run the Festival without collecting an admission fee from our visitors. Also, most of the food vendors are not-for-profit organizations -Kiwanis, Lions, and Optimists, as well as school and church groups, so the balance of their profits are funneled back into the community. So if you're looking for an excuse to have a second sizzle chop or another apple pancake roll-up, just know that the food that you're purchasing helps to support a variety of worthwhile causes. So feel free to indulge!

Tinsmiths, Apple Pressers and Blacksmiths galore

Witness period appropriate demonstrations from blacksmiths, tinsmiths, pottery and more.

As I have traveled near and far, I have seen many wondrous things. I have heard beautiful music, tasted food that was like nothing I have ever tasted before, yet watching people create the things they need for everyday living or to sell or trade is the most interesting.

Watching a man take a piece of metal, heat it up and turn it

into many different things is just as amazing as knowing the seeds I carry turn into beautiful apple trees. On one visit I watched and listened to a father playing wonderful music on a fiddle I later found he had made himself.

There are so many other things I have seen, tinkers working with tin, hand made florals, pottery and so much more. You can see all these things at the festival each vear.

It was so smooth, so crisp and fresh! Can you guess? It was Apple Cider! You can see this same process and taste the wonderful nectar of the fruit I love most here at the festival.

Look west past Johnny Appleseed's grave, the main stage. and the apple slices vendor and you'll see a bridge of sorts taking you directly to the pre1840's. You won't find a refrigerator, stove, microwave, computer, or television set. Instead, you'll see life as it was in the mid 1800's. You'll see vendors who sell or trade goods used in the period. You'll see men, women, and children dressed in period clothes, and living in tents doing the things of that time period. You will see us cooking and keeping warm with campfires the children playing games and with toys of that time. We use fire or candles for light at night.






