Arlington Park Association Board of Directors September 12, 2022 • Meeting

In Attendance: Executive Director Janie Baker, President Lynda Gevers, Vice President Bruce Westendorf, Treasurer Harlan Altena, Secretary Kyle Lehman, Roger Hubart, Alayna Hackert by proxy. Guests: John Gibson, Jennifer Hope, Jamie Duncan, Matt Bradenberger.

The meeting was called to order by Lynda Gevers, Vice President at 6 p.m.

Matt Bradenberger and fellow guests presented ideas to expand Pickleball playing options in Arlington. These included looking at expansion onto other courts, surface preparation and other equipment costs were requested.

Motion to approve July Board Minutes made, seconded and approved after a brief discussion and clarification of future sidewalk repairs. The board meeting was focused on financials presented by Janie Baker. Janie opened with a statement of financial stability.

A proposed entry was made to the budget for Pickleball expansion onto courts 6 and 7.

The long term, wage, and operations budgets were presented and discussed in detail. Overall, the proposed budget for 2023 has increased 6.4% over prior year which

is lower than the CPI of 8.6%.

A motion was made to approve the long-term expenditure budget for 2023 in the amount of \$303,886. The motion was seconded and approved.

A motion was made to approve the wage budget for 2023 in the amount of \$431,134. The motion was seconded and approved.

A motion was made to approve the operations budget for 2023 in the amount of \$1,025,660. The motion was seconded and approved.

Carryover funds will be used to fund increase sidewalk repairs, with the amount depending on ability to lock in reduced concrete pricing before planned future price increases.

The topic of increasing association dues along with budgetary and inflationary challenges was discussed in great length. A motion was made to approve an increase of annual association dues to \$770. The motion was seconded and approved.

Motion to adjourn, seconded and passed at 8:15 p.m. Next scheduled meeting will be October 3rd, 2022 at 6:00 p.m.

No carve pumpkin decorating ideas – the new trend adorning our doorsteps this Halloween

Let's face it, pumpkin carving can be a messy and tricky business. No doubt that's why non-carve pumpkin ideas are being embraced wholeheartedly by interior and crafting bloggers and instagrammers. No knife is required, yet the results are super effective and will be a fabulous addition to any Halloween-decorated home. Here are just a few of the new pumpkin decorating trends that are transforming our doorsteps this Halloween:

Paint pastel pumpkins

Who said Halloween pumpkins have to look scary? Forget the carving knife and use sugary shades to create pretty pastel painted pumpkins. Give them a quick wash first. When dry, use a chalky finish paint to cover your pumpkin. Next, add some sparkle with metallic or glitter paint to create an ombre effect.

Make a mummy

Local supermarket all sold out of pumpkins? It's time to think outside of the box! Use a butternut squash to make a whimsical Egyptian mummy. Start by painting the squash white. Once dry, apply hand-painted grey lines to look like wrapped bandages. Add googly eyes with a glue gun or super glue. Display

Add Matisse-inspired shapes

Take inspiration from Henri Matisse by covering your pumpkins in colourful abstract shapes. Paint your pumpkin white, then use a Cricut cutting machine to cut out a selection of vinyl stickers.

Stick the shapes all over your pumpkin so the colours and patterns are random. Alternatively, use different paint shades to hand draw your shapes onto your pumpkins.

Make cute characters

This one is great for younger kids! Get crafty with stickers,

tissue paper and card to turn your pumpkins into fun Halloween-themed characters. Decorated paper cups make perfect bodies for mummies, vampires, cats and even Frankenstein's monster.

Create a spooky centerpiece

Make your pumpkin the star of the table at a Halloween-themed dinner party. Place a small pumpkin on a single-tiered cake stand. Surround the bottom with fresh carnations or any of your favourite flowers. Pop a faux crow on top as an eerie finishing touch. Surround with candles for a spooky atmosphere.

As you being your summer projects remember to submit your plans to the Arlington Park Architectural Control Committee. The committee will need a copy of your survey and your construction plans 30 days prior to your beginning date.

Arlington office has many surveys stored and may be able to supply you a copy if you call 486-1967.

Also, remember to call the office for locates of the rear sidewalks lighting if you will be near the easement to the rear of the property. You can call 1-800-382-5544 for all other utilities.

Neighborhood Leaf Pickup to be announced

Leaves are beginning to change color and fall, so Fort Wayne Street Department crews are gearing up for leaf collection starting the morning of Oct. 29th.

Collections will occur two times in each of the city's more than 400 neighborhoods, with the last week of collection starting in December.

For curbside leaf pick-up residents should rake leaves to the curb or park strip in front of their home, but not into the street.

Leaves should be in the park strip by 7 a.m. on Monday of the week the leaves are to be collected for your area. Other yard waste should not be mixed with the leaves.

Residents can access daily collection updates at cityoffortwayne.org/leaves. There they will find a neighborhood schedule updated daily, collection map and general leaf collection information. This daily update will soon and residents can call 427-2603 for daily updates.

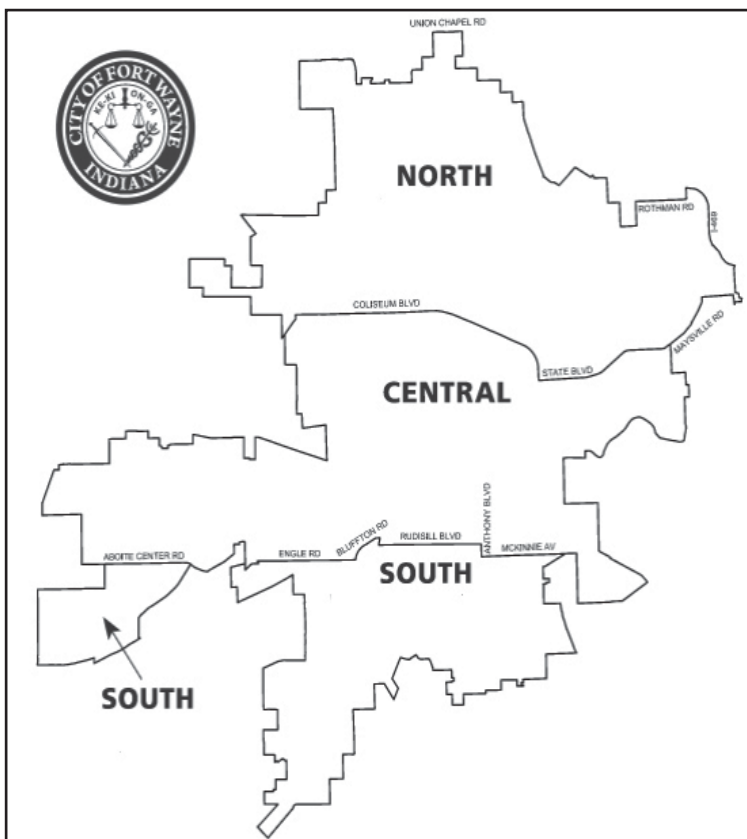
You can also schedule a pick-up if you place your leaves in biodegradable bags by calling 311. The bags should be placed at the curb and will be collected within two business days of the call.

Don't put leaves in your trash or recycling cart. This is against state law, and burning leaves is a violation of city code and can result in a fine. Don't place leaves in or over storm drains. Parents should remind children to not play in leaf piles near the street.

The 2022 Leaf Pick-Up schedule is:

- Oct. 29-Nov. 2, Central
- Nov. 5-9, South
- Nov. 13-16, North
- Nov. 19-21, Central
- Dec. 3-7, South
- Dec. 10-14, North

There will be no leaf collection on Nov. 12 for Veteran's Day or Nov. 23 and 24 for the Thanksgiving Holiday.

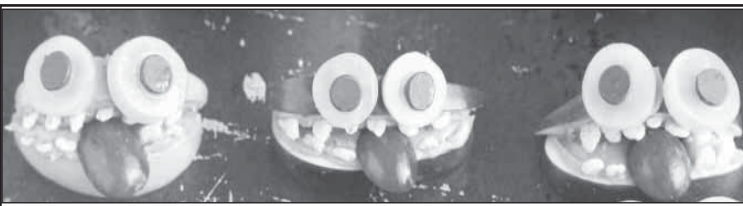

Apple Monsters

A Nut-Free, Healthy Halloween Treat!

Halloween treats can be healthy, too! These silly monster faces will be sure to make your kiddos giggle, and you'll be thrilled with the nutritious snack they're begging for during Halloween! Made with nut-free butter, these allergy-friendly Apple Monsters are perfect for class parties, too! ~

This Recipe Is: Ready in 30 Minutes or Less, Vegetarian, Allergy-Friendly Nut-Free Option.

Ingredients

1 apple
1/3 cup, plus 2 teaspoons nut-free butter spread, divided (see note)
puffed rice cereal
4 red grapes, each sliced vertically in half
8 green grapes
16 chocolate chips

Instructions

Quarter and core the apple, then quarter each piece again, so you have 16 thin wedges.

Spread 1 teaspoon nut-free butter on each apple slice.

Lay half of the apple slices on top of the other halves (matching up nut-free butter sides so the apple slices stick together), to create the "mouth."

Push puffed rice "teeth" gently into the nut-free butter, all around the "mouth," leaving room to place a red grape "tongue" on the bottom slice of each "mouth."

Place 1 red grape half in the center of each bottom slice to create the "tongue."

To create the "eyes," slice the ends off the green grapes, then cut each grape in half horizontally. (If your grapes are exceptionally large, you may get more than two "eyes" out of each one.) Using the tip of the knife, make a small slit in the top of each grape half, then place a chocolate chip, pointy-end down, into the grape, pushing the point of the chocolate chip into the slit you cut.

Place 2 small dollops of nut-free butter on the top portion of each "mouth," then gently press a grape "eye" onto each dollop.

Enjoy immediately, or store in the refrigerator for an hour or two before serving.

Notes

Nut-free butter: We chose WowButter (a soy-based, nut-free product), but you could also substitute a peanut-free sun butter (made from sunflower seeds). Alternately, if nut allergies aren't a concern, you can use regular peanut butter.



Getting darker earlier: Security Preparations

ARLINGTON SECURITY

In an effort to provide a safe environment for you and your family the Association provides approximately 4 hours per day of security. The officers patrol traffic, run periodic radar for speeding, watch your home while you are on vacation and provide a phone service for non-emergency questions.

The phone service should be used for concerns on suspicious activity or any non-emergency questions and may be reached by dialing 260-385-3562. For emergency dial 911. FWPD 260-427-1222.

When preparing for a vacation we ask that you notify the Clubhouse with the following information:

1. Name, address, phone number
2. Dates you will be away and returning
3. Who, if anyone, may have a key to your home?
4. Who to contact in case of an emergency.

Suggested Safety Preparations

1. Stop your mail and newspapers.
2. Tell your neighbors you will be out of town and ask them to alternate the timed lighting or park their car in the driveway.
3. If someone will be checking the house, ask them to alternate the timed lighting or park their car in the driveway.
4. Check all doors and windows before leaving and disconnect electrical appliances that are not necessary.

Please keep your yardlight in good working order! This will offer additional security and help deter vandalism in Arlington Park.

Arlington Park Residents: Please Check yardlights

As nights get darker longer, be prepared. Did you know that Arlington Clubhouse stocks at cost replacement photo cells, light bulbs, sockets and panes of glass?

Photo cell, yardlight bulbs rated at 12,000 hours, panes of glass and sockets for sale at the clubhouse seven days a week during normal club hours.

Cost is as follows:

Photo Cell:	\$7.50
Light Bulbs:	\$5.85
Sockets:	\$3.36
Panes of Glass	\$1.05

More no carve pumpkin decorating ideas

Decoupage a pumpkin

Use gothic decoupage papers to cover your pumpkin and add an all-over pattern. Rip your papers into rough squares, then cover a section of your pumpkin in PVA glue. Stick down the paper squares so they overlap.

Continue working until you completely cover the pumpkin and leave it to dry. If you like, you can add a spooky face using plain black paper.

TIP: Napkins would work just as well instead of decoupage papers for this project.

Add a drip effect

Make the most of leftover paint from that decorating project earlier in the year. Paint your

pumpkin white and leave to dry. Next, mix a contrasting colour with a little water to make it runny. Load up a brush and apply it to the top of the pumpkin so it drips down the sides.

Repeat until you're happy with the amount of drips and allows to thoroughly dry. Drying time will vary depending on the thickness of the paint.

Ghost Pumpkins

This spooky all-white pumpkin has proven so popular in recent years, according to Waitrose. To make your pumpkin stand out, Chris Wood, Waitrose horticulture expert suggests teaming it with the botanical trend. 'Perfect to add a splash of natural colour to Ghost Pumpkins and make

them stand out,' he says.

'Take stems such as ferns or grasses, or other thin leaf plants, and attach them to pumpkins using adhesive.'

Pumpkin planters

We predict that this is going to be one of the biggest pumpkin trends of this year. Pumpkins and succulents are an Instagram dream team.

'With many shoppers re-discovering their green fingers through lockdown, use pumpkins as planters and showcase these skills,' says Chris. 'Add colourful succulents, twigs, moss or whatever you fancy to make beautiful planters for both inside and outside the home.'

A To-Do List for Fall Gardening and Landscape Activities

Here are several to-do tasks in the fall garden for those task-oriented people who cannot ever take a rest from the chores of everyday life. You know who you are. You arrange washcloths by color in the linen closet. Your spices are arranged alphabetically — your phone calendar is arranged for every waking moment. Your death was pre-arranged before your birth. You get the drift.

Fertilize the lawn in September with a well-balanced fertilizer.

Fertilizer the lawn again in late October or early November with a fertilizer higher in the first number on the bag. 18-10-10 is a good example.

Spot-treat any broadleaved weeds with a general ready-made weed treatment.

Collect leaves in large bags — not to be placed curbside — but to be used to fill raised beds or place on the vegetable garden.

Use leaves in early spring as a mulch and fertilizer in landscape and flowerbeds. Mow some leaves back into the lawn. Core-aerate the lawn if you haven't done so in a few years.

Wait until early November to cut back perennials to about 6 inches above ground level. Some gardeners concerned about cover for wildlife can wait until March to cut back perennials — but

don't procrastinate.

If you find any bagworms — use scissors to remove and then place in a plastic bag in the trash.

Bring in any houseplants from outdoors before temperatures dip below 45 degrees.

Dig up Cannas and Dahlia bulbs just after the first frost—leave outdoors for a few days to cure — then place in a box filled with damp sawdust or vermiculite in an unheated garage until next May.

After all this — enjoy the fall color — take a hike in the woods — gaze at the moon ... and enjoy---

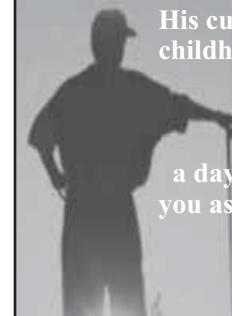
His current team are his best buds since childhood. So when you see Greg McDirmit,

Trick-or-Treaters should remember the following safety rules:

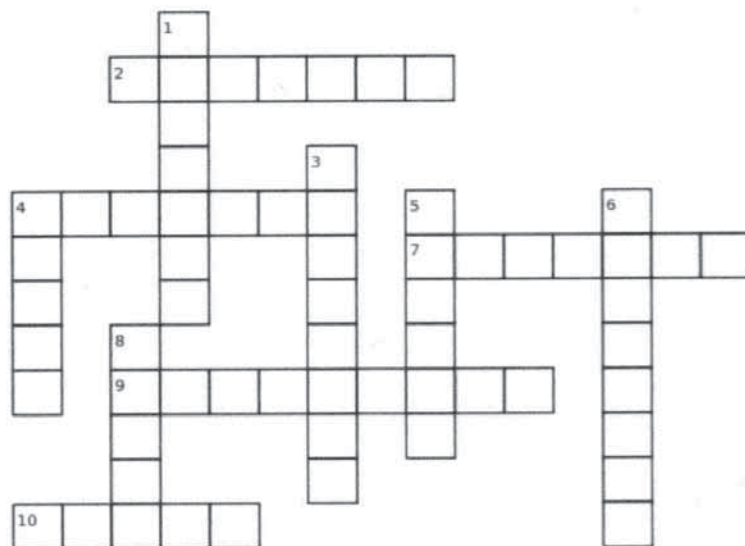
- Do not wear costumes that obscure your vision

Avoid Open Burning

As the leaves begin to fall from the trees, people look for ways to remove them. For those considering burning leaves, twigs or trash that have accumulated on their lawns, the Fort Wayne Fire Department reminds everyone to avoid open burning as a general rule.

FWFD Fire Marshal Jim Murua says, "No one is to kindle or maintain open burning consisting of a trash fire, leaf fire, refuse fire, or other open burning according to Fort Wayne City Code."

He explains that there are two exemptions allowed under certain conditions:

1. Bonfire celebrating school pep rallies are on exemption which requires obtaining a Burn Permit from FWFD at least 24 hours in advance of the permitted open burning. Call 427-1102 for more information or with questions.

2. Recreational camp fires for scouting or family cookout activities are allowed without a permit and a subject to the conditions listed below.

These exemptions must be subject to the following:

- A garden hose connected to a water supply, buckets, shovel, fire extinguisher or other approved fire-extinguishing equipment shall be readily available at the burn site.

- Only wood products shall be burned. No leaves, paper or trash.

- A fire shall be attended by a responsible party at all times until completely extinguished.

- A fire shall be located at least 25 feet away from any structure, fence or right of way.

- A fire shall not exceed an area three feet wide by two feet high.

- Anyone who recklessly, knowingly or intentionally kindles, or maintains any open burning consisting of a trash fire, leaf fire, bonfire, refuse fire, or other open burning that damages property of another person may be liable for criminal mischief.

- Any person who maintains burning of combustible materials out of doors or open burning not permitted shall be in violation and may be fined \$50. If the violator does not appear in response to a notice issued to them within a period of 30 calendar days from the date and time shown on the notice, the penalty shall be \$75. Repeat violators will be fined.

Please take the extra necessary to exercise safety at all times.
